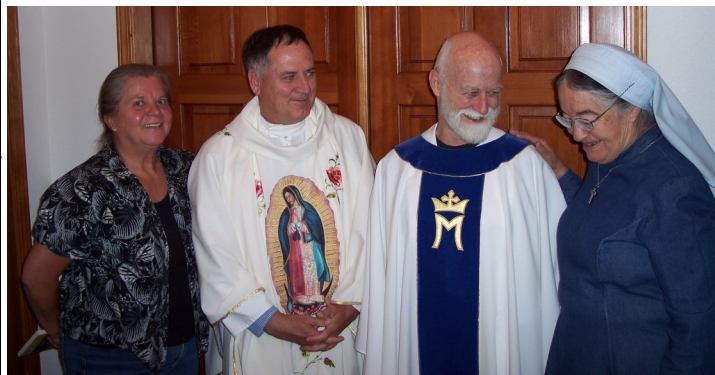
Another beautiful time of rest and prayer at Marymount. Just what the Doctor ordered!
